As we reflect on three years of navigating a pandemic, we are as motivated as ever in our mission to end partner abuse and support LGBTQ+, polyamorous, and kink survivors. Looking back, we realize that we have not been surviving through the pandemic, we have been THRIVING and creating the change we want to see in the world, all thanks to you.

The pages in this annual report highlight all the ways you have helped grow our garden this year. Because of your support, our trainers provided 123 workshops to 715 participants—that's 77 more workshops than last year and an almost 80% increase in participants. You also helped our advocates facilitate 91 support group sessions and provide 8,708 individual services to survivors. Last year we were only able to provide 12 support group sessions and 7,826 individual services. With you, we continue to build our capacity and build up our communities.

We cannot thank you--our donors, funders, supporters, volunteers, and community members--enough for the impact you've made on our ability to support survivors. Where the last three years have been uncertain and unreliable, you have shown up. Your contributions help fund positions held by survivors, hotline calls for survivors in crisis, community trainings for survivors wanting to learn more about their relationships, and so much more. We take pride in collaborating with you to empower survivors and end partner abuse.



Mission

The Network/La Red is a survivor-led social justice organization that works to end partner abuse in lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, kink, polyamorous, and queer communities. Rooted in anti-oppression principles, our work aims to create a world where all people are free from oppression. We strengthen our communities through mobilizing, education, and the provision of support services.

Anti-Oppression Principles

Identify, confront, and take action against all forms of oppression.

Root our work in the experience of survivors.

Pass the Mic





In honor of Black History Month, TNLR launched Pass the Mic – an open dialogue with various leaders in MA about the intersections of our work, and our dreams for the future of the communities we support. The first installment in the series, Surviving & Thriving: The Impact of Partner Abuse on Black LGBTQ+ Communities, was a conversation with two prominent Black leaders in Boston: Kishana Smith, Executive Director of Massachusetts Women of Color Network and Tre'Andre Carmel Valentine, Executive Director of Massachusetts Transgender Political Coalition. 
Coffee with TNLR

Coffee with TNLR is a community outreach and education event where we discuss various topics and give community members a space to process their experiences with partner abuse. We held 4 virtual sessions that covered financial abuse, the myth of mutual abuse, supporting survivors while being a survivor, and safety planning if survivors run into their abusers during pride month.

Screening Tool Conference

The Screening Tool Conference was developed to assist domestic violence providers in New England determine who is the abusive partner and who is the survivor in LGBTQ+ relationships. This year, 35 participants at 20 organizations gained expertise in the utilization of our Intimate Partner Abuse Screening Tool, developed advanced listening skills to understand systems of power and control in relationships, and engaged in interactive demonstrations and practice sessions. With unwavering commitment, The Network/La Red continues to empower organizations in building safer and more inclusive spaces for all survivors.





Learning Community (LC)

The LC is a technical assistance and collaborative learning space where partner abuse organizations come together to share knowledge, exchange experiences, and foster a deeper understanding of the unique challenges faced by LGBTQ+ survivors. 12 providers representing 5 different organizations participated in our inaugural cohort and through customized peer-to-peer support, developed processes that improve inclusion at all levels of their organizations and established concrete tasks to better serve our communities.



Direct Service

Services

24-Hour Partner Abuse Hotline

Crisis intervention, supportive counseling, safety planning, information, and referrals - 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Individual Support & Advocacy

Safety planning, court accompaniment, information and referrals, assistance accessing and navigating social, legal, medical, and/or housing services and systems, and supportive listening and counseling.

Housing Pathways Program

Transitional Housing: Up to two years of rental assistance for up to 16 survivors and their families.

Safehome: Up to a 1-month stay in a confidential location for an individual or family.

Both include ongoing supportive counseling and advocacy.


Support Groups

Phone-based, peer-to-peer support groups including LGBTQ+ and QTBIPOC groups.



Housing Pathways Program

In FY23, out of the 7 survivors who finished their time in our transitional housing program, 100% reported achieving and maintaining housing stability. Surviviors defined stability as being able to take over and maintain paying rent in their current apartment, obtaining a housing voucher for long-term subsidized housing with the support of TNLR's housing pathways advocates, or buying a home as a first-time homebuyer.





One-on-One Services

Merging the Community Services and Support Group teams increased our capacity to support survivors in short-term and ongoing one-on-one services. After transitioning back to in-person work, we have also increased the accessibility and scope of one-on-one support by meeting survivors in community throughout the state of Massachusetts, accompanying survivors to court, offering a safe and confidential

space to meet at our office, and supporting survivors in person when calling our hotline is not an option.


Group Services

We responded to an increased need for group services by shifting from time-limited group cycles to ongoing QTBIPOC and LGBTQ+ support groups. This allows more survivors to access support groups, join groups sooner, and receive ongoing support from TNLR quickly. Survivors have shared that the ongoing groups have allowed for deeper conversations, stronger group relationships, and more flexibility in how they incorporate





2022 Funding Sources



2023 Functional Expenses




2022 Functional Expenses
